An educational trip to Manchester Museum



VOICE has organized a special educational trip to visit the “Extinction or Survival” exhibition at the Manchester Museum.

The exhibition looks at the reasons why plant and animal species are pushed towards extinction and asks the question : What can we do? Here is a unique opportunity to visit the museum and learn about this important topic and discuss what the Indian philosophy has to say about it.

The programme includes a presentation and discussion on what the Indian philosophy and culture say about the preservation of plants and animal species.

Extinction or Survival is an exhibition that looks at humans’ role in the unfolding story of extinction, from over-exploitation to the destruction of habitat, but also the ways in which humans can impact positively on nature through conservation and collaboration. It ultimately asks the question, what could we all do to make a difference?

The Indian thought from ancient times has been that all life is to be respected and given equal rights. Plants and animals appear in religious beliefs, festivals, art and culture. Many Hindu Gods and Goddesses are shown with animals, for example Krishna with cow, Ganesha with mouse, Shiva with bull and Durga with tiger. Much more will be discussed on the day.
